Rally News

* RASC's Raindrop (April 19) was a Sunday afternoon rally just like such events are supposed to be. Rallymaster Cristy Breazeale made secret arrangements with the weather gods to provide sunshine, resulting in lovely views of Mt. St. Helens and the green prairie surrounding Chehalis.

The 27-car entry was a relief in these times, with a great cross section; 5 SUV's and all-ages for instance.

This included the famous Powerful Blue MGB and a few more modern sports cars. Five Oregon entries showed the wisdom of the "south" orientation of the rally.

The tour totaled up to 131 miles, 60% of those in 5 TSD sections. Since there were comfortable breaks in the Transits, the 2 hours of TSD (42%) in the five-hour rally kept the pressure on to pass the 26

checkpoints on-time. That works out to an average of a checkpoint every 4:48 minutes (3 miles).

Scoring instituted a new solution written by Marvin Crippen. He passed out thumbdrives to laptop-equipped crews with a fill-in-the-blank form prepopulated with everything except arrival times. Since his app included a way to enter official time before cars arrived (sourced from the club's Alfa clocks) and another "enter" after the checkpoint was done, the laptop's drift could be corrected on the final form. Yes, the laptops don't keep perfect time.

The thumbdrives were gathered later and scoring was accomplished on schedule. With a total of 10 points, Teresa Davenport and Russ Kraushaar edged Tom Kreger/Cynthia Bushnell by 1 point. The third place trophy went to Pat Biggar/Jack Heppes (14 pts.).

Also typical was the class competition: 6 Unlimited, followed by 4 Equipped entries, the 6 SOP'ers, and 11 Novices. I'm generalizing here, since Peng Du/Jeremy Mi won Novice class by placing 9th overall.

Steve Richards was volunteered to assign checkpoint crews. With barely enough bodies, he had to sweat using the "divided" crews best. This is where a "pair" is broken up, leaving a person as the ultimate hidden checkpoint while the car leaves to time at a different spot. The challenge is to get them far apart enough for a valid (rather than a repeat) score, yet not so far apart that they can't rejoin and hastily get to the next location. With Rod Johnson as the hider, Steve and Rod worked 6 checkpoints. Congratulations on all counts!

Being a typical Sunday afternoon rally, there was even a DNF. A Novice team discovered getting car sick after the first TSD and went home. (Article by Mark Nolte, pictures by Sally DeVore)

More about the Raindrop Scoring and CP Logger by Marvin Crippen

Last WAG I wrote an article about the death of paper checkpoint logs and the plan to replace them with an electronic product called CP-Logger. This is the follow up, after action report if you will. A "What I learned about the process."

The first thing I learned was you need more than a week notice for this kind of transition. We ended up getting buy-in from about half the workers. Which, given the time frame, is more than reasonable. Others indicated they would be interested in using it in the future, especially if there was some help available for training and setup.

Secondly this served as a very good beta test of the software. I got a lot of valuable feedback from workers for improvement, most of which has either already been implemented (easier time entry) or is in the process of being added (better color choices, especially to deal with high sun situations).

So how did it perform? Was it faster or better than the current scoring system? To answer that it might be useful to outline the scoring system we've previously used. For a number of years (about as long as I've been involved in RASC probably), we've used a chase/sweep score solution. A scoring car drives the full route behind the last car. It picks up logs and enters those times into a big spreadsheet while driving the route. For the sake of speed the times are entered as 4 numbers (MMSS). Hours are auto-entered based on perfect time and changed when needed. Given a sufficiently long finish transit, the scores are all entered by the time the scoring car arrives at the finish. Then it's just a matter of entering Time Decs. Which, of course, takes a while. To say that Time Decs are the scourge of the scorer, is to seriously understate the problem!

That system works pretty well; it has its advantages and disadvantages. But it's kind of hard on the scoring team. Especially as the number of checkpoints has

grown to a large extent over the last 6 years or so. Since I have a big chunk of the responsibility for that growth, I suppose I can't complain too much (but that really won't stop me).

The use of CP-Logger simply replaces the paper log files with an electronic version. Checkpoint workers do the data entry. Either directly into the software as cars come in, or by transcribing a paper log at the end of the checkpoint. This produces an electronic file that can be given to the scorer, either by USB drive or emailed. The scorer opens this log file, copies the data, and pastes it into the scoring program. The scorer doesn't have to shuffle a bunch of paper around (okay they do have to shuffle USB drives), doesn't have to figure out potential math errors, and they don't have to deal with messy handwriting.

This could be used with the same chase/sweep car system or by positioning the scorer at key points to collect the files. For Raindrop we went with the later.

So back to the question, "How did it perform?" Very well I think. While it was not any faster than manual log entry, I didn't expect it to be. However, it also wasn't any slower. And even with only 50% buy in, the scoring workload was significantly reduced. I am looking forward to exploring this method with No Alibi, a much larger and stringent test case.
